Exercises for Application

Exercise One: Using a Lectionary selection, prepare a proclamation. There are several ways of obtaining the current Lectionary offering; the Internet is one source. However, for those who don't have online access, here are a few of the offerings:

Easter 6 (This denotes the sixth Sunday of Easter, counting back from Easter Sunday which is the first day of Easter)

- Acts 17:22–31 (The altar "to an unknown God.")
- Psalm 66:8—20 (Antiphon: "Praise our God, O peoples, let the sound of His praise be heard.")
- 1 Peter 3:18–22 (This water symbolizes baptism that now saves you.)
- John 14:15–21 (If you love Me, obey what I command.)



Exercises for Application

Ascension (This denote the time of Jesus' ascension)

- Acts 1:1–11 (This same Jesus will come back in the same way you have seen Him go.)
- Psalm 47 (God has gone up with a shout.)
- Ephesians 1:15–23 (God placed all things under His feet.)
- Luke 24:44–53 (I am going to send you what My Father has promised.

Day of Pentecost (19 May)

- Joel 2:28–29 (I will pour out my Spirit on all people.)
- Psalm 104:24–34, 35b (Antiphon: "I will sing to the Lord all my life.")
- Acts 2:1–21 (The day of Pentecost comes.)
- John 7:37—39 (If anyone is thirsty, let him come to Me and drink.)

(If you have other Lectionary passages, use them. You are not restricted to the passages presented above. These are presented to give you feel for developing a proclamation linking Lectionary texts.)

Exercise Two: Using the *"Unofficial Church Calendar"* and taking into account some of the earlier exercises, prepare a topical proclamation for one of the special days. For you who do not have the source text, below I printed the *"Unofficial Church Calendar"* along with suggested scriptural references for those days:

31 December: Watch Night (Luke 13: 8,9)

1 January: New Year's Day (Jeremiah 6:16)

15 January: The Dr. M. L. King, Jr. Commemoration (Genesis 37: 19, 20)

1-28 February: African American History Month (Acts 19: 13-16) March/April: Palm Sunday (Matthew 21: 8,9)

March/April: Easter (Luke 24: 1-5)

May, 2nd Sunday: Mother's Day (Genesis 17: 18-21)

June, 3rd Sunday: Father's Day (Mark 5: 21-43)

July: Men's Day (Acts 9: 10-12) August: Homecoming (Nehemiah 2:17)

September: Youth Day (Ecclesiastes 12:1)

November: Thanksgiving (Luke 17: 11-19)

December: Christmas (Matthew 1: 18-23)



This calendar must also include:

Pastor's Anniversary (No particular Month as long as one is given !) (2Kings 4: 8-19)

A week of revival sermons (October):

Monday: The Worth of Worship (John 4: 19-24)

Tuesday: Asking Questions We Don't Mean; Getting Answers We Don't Want! (Luke 10: 25-37)

Wednesday: Right Here; Right Now! (Matthew 6:25-34)

Thursday: Learn How to Hush . . . Shush . . . Trust (1Corinthians 9: 24 – 27)

Friday: Fourth Day Faith! (John 11: 1-46)

A Funeral sermon/s: When God is Silent (1 King's 19: 11-13)



Auxiliary sermon:
